

ALL SAINTS CHURCH ASTON - FOCAL MINISTRY

As many of you will know, we have been without an incumbent Rector here at All Saints for over 5 years. This situation is unlikely to change largely due to financial constraints within the Diocese of Sheffield which has resulted in a reduction of around 50% in the number of stipendiary priests i.e. those allocated to a specific parish. Essentially this means a radical change in the structure and governance of local parishes.

Sheffield Diocese is tackling this with the implementation of Oversight and Focal ministry. An Oversight Minister will generally be responsible for a group of neighbouring parishes, usually assisted by 1 or 2 priests allocated to the group. At individual parish level, the Diocese is appointing Focal Ministers to be the face of the local church within the community and to work with the Oversight Minister and local churchwardens to manage the local church and ensure the continuity of services and worship. Generally, these Focal Ministers will be lay people i.e. not ordained priests or even qualified lay preachers. There is no restriction on the number of Focal Ministers any given church can have.

For us at Aston, Revd Vicky Camber has agreed to be our Oversight Minister, but ideally we need to identify one or more Focal Ministers to work alongside her.








18th April: GOOD FRIDAY, Jesus and the Thieves on the cross



Luke's account of the crucifixion (Luke 23:32-43) emphasises the mocking of the crowd, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself' (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the two men who were crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures salvation for us.

The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's taunts: 'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.' He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can He save others, when He cannot save Himself from death? He failed to see that the cross itself was the means of salvation.

So – what kind of Messiah was Jesus?

The other criminal's response in his last moments is a moving expression of faith. When challenging the other man, he spoke of the utter injustice of the crucifixion: 'this man has done nothing wrong.' He perceived the truth that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. In a wonderful picture of grace, 'remember me when You come into Your kingdom', the second thief confessed his guilt and secured Jesus' forgiveness and mercy.

In reply, Jesus promised the man life from the moment of death; 'Today you will be with Me in paradise.' Jesus used the picture of a walled garden to help the man understand His promise of protection and security in God's love and acceptance eternally.

Each one of us has to choose how we react to Jesus on the cross. Do we want Him to 'remember' us when He comes into His kingdom, or not? If you were to die tonight, how confident would you be of going to be with Jesus?

'For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God'' (1 Peter 3:18).




20th April: EASTER, the most Joyful Day of the year

Easter is the most joyful day of the year for Christians. Christ has died for our sins.

We are forgiven. Christ has risen!
We are redeemed!
We look forward to an eternity in His joy!
Hallelujah!

The Good News of Jesus Christ is a message so simple that you can explain it to someone in a few minutes. It is so profound that for the rest of their lives they will still be 'growing' in their Christian walk with God.



Why does the date move around so much? Because the date of Passover moves around, and according to the biblical account, Easter is tied to the Passover. Passover celebrates the Israelites' exodus from Egypt, and it lasts for seven days, from the middle of the Hebrew month of Nisan, which equates to late March or early April.

Sir Isaac Newton was one of the first to use the Hebrew lunar calendar to come up with firm dates for the first Good Friday: Friday 7th April 30 AD or Friday 3rd April, 33 AD with Easter Day falling two days later. Modern scholars continue to think these two Fridays to be the most likely.

Most people will tell you that Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox, which is broadly true. But the precise calculations are complicated and involve something called an 'ecclesiastical full moon', which is not the same as the moon in the sky. The earliest possible date for Easter in the West is 22nd March, which last fell in 1818. The latest is 25th April, which last happened in 1943.

Why the name, 'Easter'? In almost every European language, the festival's name comes from 'Pesach', the Hebrew word for Passover. The Germanic word 'Easter', however, seems to come from Eostre, a Saxon fertility goddess mentioned by the Venerable Bede. He thought that the Saxons worshipped her in 'Eostur month,' but may have confused her with the classical dawn goddesses like Eos and Aurora, whose names mean 'shining in the east'. So, Easter might have meant simply 'beginning month' – a good time for starting up again after a long winter.

Finally, why Easter eggs? On one hand, they are an ancient symbol of birth in most European cultures. On the other hand, hens start laying regularly again each Spring. Since eggs were forbidden during Lent, it's easy to see how decorating and eating them became a practical way to celebrate Easter.


When I come to the end of my journey

AUGHTON COURT HOSPITAL - FROMERLY ASTON HALL



Aughton Court Hospital with the fire escape and the day room extension, the roof can just be seen in front of the church tower.

At the end of the Second World War Sir Ronald Matthews and his family never returned to Aston Hall. They had lived at Letwell during the war whilst the Hall was used as offices for the London and North Eastern Railway. In 1948 they sold Aston Hall and the cottage at Letwell and moved to Wadworth Hall near Doncaster which, coincidentally, was the home of Ann Wordsworth who married Harry Verelst in 1771 and came to live at Aston Hall soon afterwards.

Aston Hall never reverted to private ownership. In 1948 it was bought by the West Riding County Council for £7,000. Sheffield No 2 Hospital Management Committee had its headquarters at Middlewood Hospital and was responsible for the administration of a number of Sheffield hospitals and hostels mainly for patients with mental illness. In 1948 it took over Aston Hall and opened it as Aston Hall Institution, with 62 beds for mentally handicapped female patients. It was later renamed Aughton Court Hospital, probably because there was already an Aston Hall Psychiatric Hospital in South Derbyshire.

In August 1972 there was a report in the Sheffield Star about Aughton Court Hospital. It reported that conservationists had lost their fight to prevent Sheffield No. 2 Hospital Management Committee from erecting a factory-built extension on to the former Aston Hall, which was designed by the famous York Architect John Carr.



'Following an unofficial inquiry, the committee have been given the go-ahead to build a day room costing about £10,000 on to the building now known as Aughton Court Hospital.' Both Hallamshire Historic Society and the Georgian Society objected to the plan, contending that it would spoil the facade of the hospital, which is used for female mentally sub-normal patients.

An official of the Department of the Environment said it had been agreed to seek an assurance from the Department of Health that the building would be in position for only 10 years. That is the possible life of the hospital and when it ceases to be used for this purpose the day room should be removed from the side of the house.

The official said: "It was agreed by those at the unofficial inquiry that the day room in its present position would spoil the facade of the Hall, although it had already been spoiled to a certain extent at this point by a large fire escape." Mr John Woolman of the Hallamshire Historic Building Society said: "This is most unsatisfactory and there is no guarantee that it (the day room) will be removed in 10 years' time." Well, as we all know the day room was not removed and is still in use.

In 1982, responsibility for the 56 women patients then living in Aughton Court Hospital was transferred from Sheffield Area Health Authority to Rotherham Health Authority. After that date there were no further admissions to Aughton Court and as a result of deaths, discharges and transfers the number of patients reduced to 39

The Health Authority said that 'extensive maintenance work was required to make the structure safe and maintenance costs would be a continuing drain on Resources'. They therefore decided to close Aughton Court at the end of 1984. The patients would be housed in community units and those with more severe handicaps would be accommodated at Beechcroft Hospital in Rotherham.

'All staff involved in the proposed changes had been consulted and so far as possible their preferences would be borne in mind when the redeployment of staff was organised. The firm intention was not to make any staff redundant.' Aughton Court was closed in 1984 and that year it was used to house the police during the miners' strike. In 1987 it was bought and renovated and opened as Aston Hall Hotel.

Since then the hotel has changed hands several times and been extended and a new conference and event centre built. It is now a Best Western Plus Hotel.



NEW ELECTORAL ROLL

In line with the Church Representation Rules once every six years the preparation of New Church Electoral Rolls takes place.

2025 is a year for a New Church Electoral Roll to be prepared.

This means that every person who wishes to have his or her name entered on the new Roll, whether it is entered on the present Roll or not, is requested to apply for enrolment not later than **20 April 2025**.




