

On the Art of Drinking Well

The Rectory
St James the Least of All



My dear nephew Darren,

You closed your last letter with the remark that it was time to retire to bed with a cup of cocoa. That may be all very well for the pious intensity of a theological college – although a stiff whisky was always acceptable in my day – but it is not a style to continue once in the parish. I do feel obliged to give you a few hints about what should and should not be drunk in public as a parish priest.

Morning visits are to be discouraged, but if one is unavoidable, and you are invited to have a drink, then it has to be coffee. It is the only time of day when a mug is acceptable – provided, of course, that it is bone china or porcelain. In the afternoons one changes to tea, but only from cups. Blended varieties may be all very well for Curates in their first year, but it should be Darjeeling for an incumbent. And fruit teas are for Quakers only.

If an inappropriate vessel is offered, then the drink should be accepted, but left untouched. Since the visit will be discussed in the finest detail throughout the parish the moment you have left, your host will soon learn why and not make the same error a second time. It is for the same reason that if you ever want to circulate a piece of news round the parish as quickly as possible, never put it in the parish magazine, just mention it casually during one of your visits. Everyone will know by teatime.

Alcoholic drinks must be carefully judged. A sherry – dry, naturally – is probably best if you are invited to lunch. In the early evening, a gin and tonic would be the drink of choice. To ask for whisky would indicate that you are about to go over to Rome, and a mineral water that you have your roots in non-conformity. Beer is never, ever drunk in someone's house unless you suffer from some personal tragedy, such as being the diocesan youth chaplain.

However, an occasional beer in the pub with the bell-ringers (who will be real ale fanatics to a man) or after choir practice – which seems to be the real purpose of holding practices anyway – or as a treat for the sacristan, will show you are a man of the people. It is some years since I visited the pub.

Understanding wine should be taught at every theological college as an essential part of the ministry. Develop a taste for claret, dear boy, and you will be starting your journey towards high office.

And perhaps you should give that tin of cocoa to the verger.



4th February – Phileas : brave bishop and martyr of Egypt

When did you first encounter Christianity? If it was as an adult, then Phileas is a saint for you. His life shows that Truth matters, whenever you encounter it, but is also a warning that you need to count the cost of becoming a Christian.

Phileas was a rich man living in Egypt at the end of the third century, when he first met Christians. Highly educated, he did not convert quickly, but instead studied their Gospels, and also at least part of the New Testament. Only then did he conclude that Jesus was indeed the Son of God.



It was good that Phileas had done his research and was firm in his faith, because after his conversion, events came thick and fast. In those pressured times, the Church hadn't the luxury of long training programmes for leaders, and so Phileas was chosen to be bishop of his city in the Thebaid, a desert region of ancient Egypt.

Sadly, the new bishop hardly ever had a chance to pastor his flock. Soon after his consecration at Alexandria in 303, Phileas was arrested under the edicts of the Roman emperor Diocletian. He spent the next three years in prison, deeply moved by the willing martyrdoms of other Christians around him. Finally, in 306, it was Phileas' turn. He faced the questioning of the prefect, Culcianus, who could not fathom why such a previously wealthy man had thrown his life away to follow some (long dead?) carpenter from Galilee.

Phileas' strength now was that he really knew what the Bible said. And so when questioned about Jesus's divinity, he replied that "... He performed the works of God in power and actuality... He cleansed lepers, made the blind see, the deaf hear, the lame walk, the dumb speak, He drove demons from His creatures at a command; He cured paralytics, raised the dead to life, and performed many other signs and wonders."

Still Culcianus urged him to save his life, by sacrificing to the gods. Phileas again had a biblical answer ready. Paraphrasing St Paul, he said that the sacrifices which God requires are "a pure heart, a spotless soul and spiritual perceptions which lead to deeds of piety and justice..." Pressed one final time, he replied "I have reflected many times, and this is my decision." And so, he was led out and beheaded.



14th February - St Valentine's Day : Aspects of Romantic Love

God obviously approves of romance - after all, putting Adam and Eve alone together in the Garden of Eden was His idea.

The history of the Israelites began with three great romances: Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, and Jacob and Rachel. The on-going history of Israel was deeply affected by later romances: Esther and King Xerxes, David's love affair with Bathsheba, and Solomon's marriage to hundreds of foreign wives. There is even an entire book in the Old Testament devoted to human love: the Song of Solomon!



When we reach the New Testament, we find real love between Joseph and Mary (even when Joseph thought Mary had been faithless, he did not want to harm her). St Paul, though himself a bachelor, nevertheless spent a lot of time urging Christians to love and be kind and faithful and considerate to their spouses. He even wrote 1 Corinthians 13 - the great love chapter that is read at millions of weddings worldwide 2000 years later.

Down the centuries ever since, romantic love has been critical in shaping history (Anthony and Cleopatra), in shaping cultural ideals (King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table). Some of our favourite stories are built on romance. (Puccini's *Tosca*, Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*, Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice*, Charlotte Brontë's *Jane Eyre*.)

Today, romance is still alive and well in Britain - last year we sent about 25 million Valentines to each other.

And what of the future? Well, just as the Bible begins with a love story, so it ends with one. And you are involved! For actually the greatest Love Story of all time is that between God and his people.

Christ is described in Revelation as our heavenly Bridegroom, and the Church is His beloved Bride. He has given us the most expensive present of all - Himself. And, just as in all the best romances, the story will end with the bride and groom getting together at last, so at the End of Time, Christ will return for His Bride.

NEW METHODIST CHURCH ON LODGE LANE 1953



On the 7th February 1953, the Rotherham Advertiser reported on the opening of a new church on Lodge Lane.

Aston Terrace Methodists saw a large part of their plans for Methodist advancement brought to a head last Saturday when the new church in Lodge Lane was opened. The Rev. Jos. Staines (Superintendent Minister of the Kiveton Park Circuit) presided at the opening, and was supported by the Rev G Faulkner (former Superintendent of the Circuit), the Rev Donald Streat (Chairman of the Sheffield Methodist District), the Rev W O Phillipson (Secretary of the Chapel Building Committee, Manchester), Mr J Short (a trustee of the Aston Methodist Church and Secretary of the Trust) and others.

Buses brought contingents from Anston, Kiveton Park and Dinnington and the church was crowded, some boys and girls being seated on the pulpit steps. The church was opened by Lady Turner, wife of Sir James Turner of South Anston, who expressed the hope that the church would continue to be filled. A bouquet was presented to her by Margaret Owen.

The church was dedicated by the Rev Donald Streat, who presided at an afternoon meeting. He said that gladly and solemnly they dedicated the church, and prayed for a long life of usefulness for it. The Rev W Oliver Phillipson preached the opening sermon and stressed the need for facing up to the responsibilities of the age. This was an age of difficulty, he said, and new ways of working had to be found. Our national life would never be the same as it had been, in one sense; and we needed courage, insight and vision to make of the world what it should be.

Individual effort was very necessary, and mattered much in the scheme of things. Personalities counted tremendously, especially in church life. There was work for all to do. After the service, tea was provided in the old chapel at Aston Terrace and about 200 were present.



An evening meeting was presided over by Dr L Ward-Kay of Sheffield, (Vice president Elect of the Methodist Conference). Fraternal greetings and good wishes were extended by the Rev M A Beaton (Swallownest Baptist Minister) and the Rev T H E Japing (Rector of Aston). The Rev Donald Streat was the preacher and Mrs Staines sang "The Stranger of Galilee" and Handel's "Largo".


On Sunday, the morning preacher was the Rev J Staines and the evening preacher Mr Fox of Halfway. The organist at all the services was Mr L Short. On Sunday afternoon a Sunday School was opened and attended by 90 children. The proceeds for the weekend totalled about £140 towards the £500 still needed to defray the cost of the new building.

The building, which is a brick one, comprises a main hall and vestries, and cost about £6,500. The seating was a gift from Hodthorpe Church, where two churches have been amalgamated and was given to Aston by the trustees. The foundation stones were laid last April, among them being one laid by Sir George Kenning.

The church has had an interesting career. From being held in an engine house at the old Aston Colliery, it progressed to the Aston Terrace Church in 1901. Part of the premises (the schoolroom) was used by the West Riding County Council as an auxiliary school for Aston Primary School since 1944. That church fulfilled a need up to the present, but with the condemning of some of the property at Aston Terrace and the development of Aston along Lodge Lane, it was felt that it was out of touch with the people. The church was in a bad position and until Brookhouse Colliery opened there was no proper road to it. The Kiveton Park Circuit began the building fund for a new church, backed up in a determined way by Mr B Willoughby of Dinnington, who continually pressed for a new church. A sum of £2,500 came from the Joseph Rank Trust, and a considerable sum from the Chapel Building Committee and from the Sheffield District Trust.

In 1994 this church was demolished and a new church known as Central Methodist Church was built on the site.
